17.04.13 - GREAT SOUTH WEST WALK: TORCROSS TO EAST PORTLEMOUTH

On Wednesday 17th April, NCI Prawle Point watchkeepers, took part in the section of the Great South West Walk from Torcross to East Portlemouth, along with leader Ken Carter and fifteen other walkers. The group was spared the arduous two mile detour around the cliff fall west of Lannacombe, thanks to the kindness of the landowner who allowed access across his garden. At the Prawle Point Coastwatch Station, the walkers were welcomed into the Visitor Centre for refreshments.

Later in the walk, at a point overlooking Mill Bay the walkers met artist Dave Crocker who is undertaking a project to paint 365 pictures of the South West Coastal Path with part of the proceeds going to the Association.

The Great South West Walk, which celebrates the Association's 40th anniversary, has, through commercial sponsorship, already achieved its £250,000 target to finance improvements to the coast path and now aims to widen its programme. Walkers in relays are completing the 630 miles of the South West Coast Path. There are separate walks along the north and south coast and one of a pair of red boots is being carried on each walk. The two boots will be reunited when walkers on the final leg of the walks meet at Land's End on 7th May.

01.04.13

The new touchscreen information kiosk is now fully operational in the Visitor Centre adjacent to the Lookout. It is loaded with an amazing variety of information including current weather and tides, a 'live' chart identifying current ship movements, videos about the NCI and Salcombe lifeboats, including some dramatic wrecks and rescues, pictorial displays on local and natural history and information about South Devon AONB. The new kiosk provides yet another reason for visiting Prawle Point, but with so much to take in you'll need to allow plenty of time when you get there!

22.03.13

Last Sunday, in order to maintain its position as part of the local Search and Rescue (SAR) Service, the Prawle Point NCI station underwent an annual assessment for what is known as Declared Facility Status (DFS). The Assessor - a member of the national NCI Assessment Team, supported by a liaison officer from HM Coastguard - thoroughly tested the responsiveness and expertise of six of the station's watchkeepers with technical questions, practical exercises and emergency scenarios. The station's operating procedures, equipment, documentation and training arrangements were also the subject of rigorous scrutiny.

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An important part of the annual assessment is a joint exercise with the station's SAR partners. The object of this year's exercise, which was undertaken with the crews of the Salcombe All-Weather and Inshore Lifeboats, was to guide the lifeboats to 'a person' spotted in the water by the NCI watchkeepers. A dummy, with the delightful name of 'Dead Fred', was dropped overboard a mile or so away from the lifeboat assigned to its recovery and the duty watchkeepers then gave constant position updates and course corrections over the radio to guide or 'con' the boat safely towards the target. Four separate rescue runs were undertaken and, on one of these, the two lifeboats, starting from different positions, were guided simultaneously. Even with the advantage of an elevated position up on the Point, the sun's rays made it difficult on occasion for the watchkeepers to spot the target and keep it 'eyeballed', but fortunately in each case an efficient recovery was made.

The Assessor's conclusion was that the station 'not only passed but excelled'. Continued DFS status was accordingly confirmed. Thanks to the commitment and hard work of the watchkeeping team, the station is in a good state of readiness for the busy boating season ahead.

08.03.13

In addition to keeping watch up at 'the Point', Coastwatch members take part in a variety of activities 'off-station'. On February 28 a group were set to visit Salcombe Lifeboat Station to be shown round Baltic Exchange III by members of its crew. On March 7 and 15 visits are being made to Brixham Coastguard where our newer members will see how the Coastguard co-ordinate rescue operations and, on March 12, an officer of the UK Borders Agency will attend our monthly meeting.

Monthly meetings are held at 7.30pm on the second Tuesday of each month in Charleton Village Hall and, apart from the March and October training meetings, they are open to all. Our guest speakers cover a variety of topics, so do come along if you are interested in any of the following. There's no charge! Prawle Point watchkeepers have been congratulating Honorary President, Jon Gifford on being awarded the OBE for services to maritime safety. Jon began his long and rewarding association with NCI as a volunteer watchkeeper at the Prawle Point Station in 1999 soon after the initial opening. His management and organisational skills together with exceptional abilities in leadership and motivation lead to his rapid rise through local and national levels to become Chairman of NCI in 2002- a full-time occupation undertaken with tireless energy and enthusiasm. At that time, watchkeepers numbered around 700 manning 23 lookout stations but, thanks to Jon's personal drive and commitment, there are now some 2000 volunteers operating 46 stations in England and Wales. Such an achievement involved many miles of travelling in search of prospective new stations followed by legal negotiations, fund-raising, recruitment and training of personnel all fired by Jon's passionate belief in the necessity of visual watch along the coast. His wife, Rosemary has been an unflinching support throughout these twelve years. Simultaneously he has devoted much time toward strengthening links with HM Coastguard, the RNLI and the UK Border Agency as well as the National Trust, Councils and landowners of adopted lookout sites.

All this time Jon continues to serve as Chairman on the Prawle Point committee of management but last April he stepped down from the position of National Chairman to become Honorary President of the Charity giving him more time to resume duties as a watchkeeper at his home station of Prawle Point. He has been welcomed back with much affection and pride.

New book published as part of the Visitor Centre Refurbishment Project

The South Devon coast between Start Point and Salcombe Bar, with Prawle Point, the county's southernmost extremity, at its centre, is well known for its impressive scenery, geology and wildlife. It can also lay claim to a rich and eventful past.

In a new book, published as part of the Heritage Lottery Funded Prawle Point Visitor Centre refurbishment project, Roger Barrett, local historian and Station Manager at the Prawle Point Lookout, describes how people have sought, over the centuries, to defend this coast against the threat of invasion, piracy and smuggling, wrest a living from its shores and safeguard the lives of those in peril on the sea.
